St Andrew's Starbeck "building for the future"



The foundation stone for our present building was laid in 1909, and the building was completed in 1910. Today, in 2010 the building limits our ability to serve the community of Starbeck well. We are planning changes to make the building more hospitable and more accessible; to provide for the comfort and needs of all visitors, and to create a warm, well equipped and welcoming meeting space, including a large and flexible worship area.

The Plan

The building project has a long time scale and we have a plan of how we expect the activities to proceed. We have already obtained outline plans from the architects, which were shared with the church at our APCM on Monday 27^{th} April 2009. These have been on display in the church since then. The architects have now completed their detailed topographical survey of our building so they now have detailed drawings showing the levels and features of our present structure. The next stage is for the architects to create very detailed plans in order for us to seek planning permission from the local authority; this stage will cost just over £12,000 and the PCC approved this at our meeting on 28^{th} January.

After that, the plan looks like this:

So, even from now, we are looking at a very long project, which has already run for more than two years (albeit with most activity in the background). But the project, is real, is moving forward and is on track to improve our facilities and to make the building easily accessible to all people regardless of their ability.

The cost

At our APCM in April 2009 we showed the building plans and explained that we expect to proceed with phases 1 and 2 (new entrance, narthex, café and office area, kitchen and toilets). The total cost for this is expected to be £500,000 (in round figures). The money is needed in stages in line with the plan above. Some has already been spent: the architects' outline plans and topographical survey have been paid for. Members of the PCC have pledged money for the next stage, i.e. for the architects to create very detailed plans in order for us to seek planning permission from the local authority, and agreed that the architects can start this work.

Clearly we need to raise a considerable sum of money to proceed through all the stages shown in the plan above. This will be done using both internal fund raising from our own worshipping community, and external fundraising using grants from trusts and organisations that have money available for charitable purposes. We are now starting both these processes. Our first major internal fund-raising activity will be a gift day in March. We will be publicising this in February and March and providing details of how you can give. This is a very important activity for us as a church: it will be our first opportunity to show our commitment and enthusiasm for this project. However, we will not simply be taking up an offering for the building project. Clearly we are talking about very significant sums of money to make this project viable, but we do not need most of the money in the short term. Looking at the plan above, we can see that costs will be incurred over a period of time, most of it in the construction phase.

So as we hold our gift day in March, what we are looking for is not just gifts of cash or cheques. More importantly we are looking for pledges and promises: for example, statements that say "*I will pledge ??? pounds when planning permission is obtained"* or "*I will pledge ??? pounds when construction starts"*, or "*I will loan ??? pounds for the construction phase"*.

Loans will be very helpful because some external funding will not be paid until project completion, even though we will have bills to meet throughout the project timescale.

So we don't necessarily need much money in March, but we will be looking for pledges and promises so we can establish the level of financial support that we as a body of Christ's people will be willing to give to this project.

Prayer, Prayer and Prayer

Don't forget that this whole Project must be underpinned by Prayer in order for it to succeed and the for PCC and Building Team members to receive guidance as we proceed. The Prayer team meets on a Thursday evening but please include our team and decision-making in your daily prayer life.
